

February 22 // QUEEN NZINGA



Nzinga Mbande was born in 1582, said to have had the umbilical cord around her neck, her name translated from Kimbundu dialect in Angola means "twist". Her mother was recorded as being enslaved and was not the 1st wife of King Ndongo. Nzinga was educated, spoke and wrote Portuguese and converted to Christianity she is referred to as Ana de Sousa in Portuguese. Following her father's death her brother, originally heir to the throne, committed suicide due to Portuguese Slave concessions. "In 1627, after forming alliances with former rival states, she led her army against the Portuguese, initiating a thirty-year war against them. She exploited European rivalry by forging an alliance with the Dutch who had conquered Luanda in 1641. With their help, Nzinga defeated a Portuguese army in 1647." Queen Nzinga was vigilant in her diplomacy and despite many threats on her life, she died peacefully at the age of 81 and mentored her sister Kambu to continue to rule the Congo region.

February 23 // GASPAR YANGA



Brought to Mexico in chains as youngster, Yanga among countless Africans was enslaved along the gulf of Mexico-which was referred to as New Spain. Living on the Nuerstra Señora de la Concepción plantation, Yanga contributed to the production of sugar. But one victorious day Yanga fled the plantation in 1570 and would continue to grow his Palenque tribes to fight against Spanish mobs from 1570-1609. After several recorded battles, one at Rio Blanco, even after the Spanish Crown burned down Yanga's settlements, his army would eventually free what was then the Maroon territory under Spanish rule in 1618. Yanga knowing the lay of the land land and having retreated with his tribe had the advantage. "A pure victory could not be named. Yanga's settlement came back together. In 1632, New Spain viceroy Rodrigo Pacheco negotiated with the aged Veracruz ruler. The palenque would no longer entice slaves, and the Yanga followers would own their land. The Veracruz town of San Lorenzo de los Negros would come to be called Yanga." Today, VeraCruz Mexico is noted to have one of the largest Afro-Mezo populations, the indigenous names of neighboring towns like Matamba and Mozomboa combine Spanish, Indigenous and African cuturas. Professor of Latin American Culture, and native of Vera Cruz, Dolorez Florez-Silva is the co-creator of the film <u>El Grito de Yanga</u>. Festival de Negritude was first staged in 1986, celebrating the hero, founder and one of our OG (Originally from Gabon) Freedom Fighters Yanga.

February 24 // O.W. GURLEY



Visionary, Businessman and Millionaire Developer Ottawa W. Gurley was born Christmas day in 1868. Both of his parents were enslaved in Alabama. Gurley attended grade school and is noted for being self taught in Business ventures. Gurley held several jobs, he taught and served with US Postal Service. He married Emma Wells in 1889 and relocated to what was then Oklahoma Territory. Gurley began running a General Store in Perry, Oklahoma. Ten years later after having a successful storefront, Gurley and his wife moved to the Oil town of Tulsa. It was there that Gurley purchased 40 Acres of land, established his 1st Roomin' House located on what would become historic Greenwood Ave. The segregation of Jim Crow benefited Gurley and soon other associates would strategize, invest, and build wealth in Tulsa. Among Barbershops, Cafe's and Billards Parlors, Gurley built 3 two-story buildings, 5 residences and also acquired an 80-acre farm in Rogers County, Oklahoma. Gurley is noted as the founder of Vernon AME Church as well as a Black Masonic Lodge and is credited for offering small loans to numerous black Business-folk and entrepreneurs. It was recorded that Gurley's net worth was over \$155,00 to 500,000 between 1914 and 1921 equivalent to 3 Million -13.6 Million in present day. By 1921 Gurley owned over 100 properties, but the town of Tulsa would be torched and terrorized by Whites, racially charged with hate, envy and violence.

The Tulsa Race Massacre traumatized the town and families. The

effects were crippling to most Black businesses and economic development. Originally it was reported that Gurley had been lynched by one of the White Mobs, but he and his wife re-located to Los Angeles and managed a small hotel. Gurley's legacy will live on as an inspiration to all of us in the Diaspora. The 2009 documentary, *Before They Die*, interviews numerous survivors and pushes froward the promise of Reparations for descendants of Tulsa's Community.

February 25 // STEPHANIE D. WILSON



An Engineer & Astronaut, Wilson currently holds the NASA record for the most logged days in space by any Black Astronaut. Wilson earned her B.S. degree from Harvard in Engineering Science in 1988, she began her career working for Lockheed Martin, then called Martin and Marietta Astronautics Group. Wilson went on to acquire her Masters of Science in Aerospace Engineering from University of Texas. Wilson was selected by NASA in April 1996, ten years later Wilson flew her first mission on a 13 day flight abroad the Discovery shuttle. The following year in 2007 Wilson flew on a 6.25 million mile 15-day shuttle mission. Wilson's last space travel was in April of 2010, where she was aboard the Discovery shuttle once again to deliver hardware, supplies and experimental equipment to the space station. Wilson served two years as NASA's Space Station Integration Branch Chief and in 2017 she was named head of Mission Support Crew Branch. She has received 8 awards, some including Harvard College Women's Professional Achievement Award, Johnson Space Center Director


Commendation Award and has received 5 NASA Medals. Wilson has been selected as one of the 18 members to *board mission Artemis* 2024 to visit and land on the moon.

February 26 // IKA HUGEL - MARSHALL



Author & Afro-German Activist Ika was born during World War II to a Black American father Eddie Marshall & Bavarian mother. Ika's mother and father had met secretly during the war and upon her father's return to the States. Ika was soon ostracized as a mixed-child then known as one of the *"occupation -babies"*- which Germans viewed with contempt. Unfortunately, Ike's mother married a German man, had another child and complied to send Ika to an Orphanage. Ika endured years of trauma, prejudice and discrimination due to her mixed heritage. She attempted to find her father several times, and eventually met him a year before his death. In the 1980's Ika met poet Audre Lorde, and became fiercely involved in the feminism movement and was encouraged to connect to other Afro-Germans. She is noted as one of the founding members of the ADEFRA Afro- Deutsche Frauen and was co-author of the documentary "Audre Lorde- There Berlin Years 1984-1992. Ika would eventually earn a degree in Social Pedagogics, she become a Psycho- therapist specializing in Intercultural studies, she also taught as a Professor of Gender Studies and Psychological Counseling in Berlin. Her 1998 Autobiography Daheim unterwegs: Ein deutsches Leben/ The Invisible Woman: Growing Up Black in Germany "It has been described as "an intensely moving journey in search of herself... a personal story, but also a microcosm of racism in contemporary Germany". Ika, was also an accomplished artist and wood sculptor, she unexpectedly passed away last April at age 75.


February 27 // DERRICK BELL



Bell was born in the 1930's in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, he entered Duquesne University, but was enlisted in the Air Force and served in the Korean War. Bell returned to Pittsburg Law School and was the only Black graduate of his class in 1957. Bell was working with the Dept. of Justice, but was asked to cancel his membership with the NAACP due to a potential conflict of interest, Bell resigned from his job and soon thereafter was hired by the legendary Thurgood Marshall to serve on the organizations Legal Defense Fund. In the height of the Civil Rights Movement and in the midst of the Brown vs. Board of Education aftermath, Bell began working on behalf of the NAACP to pursue legal suits against southern School Districts. He realized the violence was real and that the promise of integration would eventually result in the demise of Black centered education. After disagreements with NAACP leaders, Bell left the Legal Defense Fund in 1966 and began working at USC's Law School and served at the Public Interest Legal Center, three years later he would become the first tenured professor of African heritage at Harvard'sLaw School. Bell would go on to compile many great writings and constructive theories about Race, Law and progressive Politics, his 1970 text, Race, Racism and American Law which has been revered as the pillar of Critical Legal Studies, which would influence Critical Race Theory. Bell argued that..." racial progress had occurred mainly when it aligned with white interests-beginning with emancipation, which, he noted, came about as a prerequisite for saving the Union. Between 1954 and 1968, the civil-rightsmovement brought about changes that were thought of as a second Reconstruction." Bell left Harvard in 1980 to take a role as

the Dean of Oregon University's School of Law, but resigned in protest of the department choosing to not hire an Asian candidate. He returned to Harvard, but similar issues emerged when Bell advocated for a woman of Color candidate. Bell decided to take a leave of absence from Harvard and began teaching at New York University's School of Law. Bell's 1970 text - often critiqued and considered controversial has been required for many US Law Schools. Though he believed that racism in America will continue to be "an integral, permanent, and Indestructible feature of American life, due to what he called the "interest convergence dilemma" which posited that whites would never eliminate racism unless it was in their own self-interest to do so. " Bell has written the following books; Silent Covenants: Brown v. Board of Education and the Unfulfilled Hopes for Racial Reform (2005), Ethical Ambition: Living a Life of Meaning and Worth (2002), Afrolantica Legacies (1998), Gospel Choirs: Psalms of Survival in an Alien Land Called Home (1997), Confronting Authority: Reflections of an Ardent Protester (1996), Faces at the Bottom of the Well: The Permanence of Racism (1992), and We Are Not Saved: The Elusive Quest for Racial Justice (1987) and Shade of Brown: New Perspectives on School Desegregation (1980). February 28 // KORLA PANDIT



Musician, Actor and Mesmerist Korla Pandit was an accomplished pianist and organist who is credited for creating the 1950's music genre Exotica. Korla's career sprouted out of his first official gig in 1948, as the Music Director supplying background music and sound effects on the radio show Chandu the Magician. Korla became popular for his blends of Indian, exotic eastern rhythms weaved with Waltz and mediative notes.

Korla's career took flight after he appeared at the Furrier's Fashion show in Hollywood, and he was approached by Klaus Landsberg, who offered him his own 15 minute spot on television with the KTLA network and musical accompaniment for a puppet show Time for Bearny, with one stipulation, that Korla not speak a word during the show, but gaze into the camera as he played the hammond organ and piano. Korla became an overnight sensation and instantly grew a fan base and was recording albums with the band Sons of the Pioneers with RCA and then recorded albums as a solo artist with Vita Records. In 1954 Korla established his own label India Records where he released The Universal Language of Music series 1-5. Korla would sell his pressed albums across California from Palm Springs through to Santa Cruz, Santa Rosa and Canada. Korla would go on to release dozens of singles & albums between the late 50's and early 70's records including Hypnotique (1961), Love Letters (1960), Christmas with Korla (1961), Pipes of Pan (1971) and Music for Meditation (1971). After doing many tours and *live performances*, Korla did take somewhat of a hiatus, it was in the 90's as Tiki- Lounges emerged and he drew a new generation of followers and dancers, Korla would appear at the Bimbo;s 365 Club in San Francisco.


Korla had married his wife Beryl De Beeson in Tijuana, Mexico back in 1944, they had to leave the country due to the laws against inter-racial marriage in California. To this union two sons (Shari and Koram) wereborn. It wasn't until after Korla's death in 1998, that his nephew Ernest Redd along with R.J. Smith exposed that Korla's ancestry was one of a fair completed Black man born in St. Louis, Missori and his birth name was John Redd. John also used a pseudonym Juan Rolando, and was born among six siblings from a Baptist Pastor Ernest Redd and Doshia Johnson, a mulatto woman, both of which were children of former slaves. Korla, Juan, John... this man of magnificent talent was featured in Stanford Professor Allyson Hobbs' 2014 A Chosen Exile: A History of Racial Passing in American Life. That same year, close friends John Turner and Eric Christensen produced the *documentary Korla*, about the life and times of our man of mystique John Redd, Juan Rolando and the mesmerist Korla Pandit.








