

Edson Arantes do Nascimento, globally known to futbol enthusiasts as Pele was one of the world's most beloved athletes. Pele was born October 23rd, 1940 to Dondinho and Dona Celeste in the town of Tres Coracoes, Brazil. His father was a local soccer player and at an early age Pele could be found in the neighborhood playing soccer with balled up newspapers stuffed in a sock. Though his friends were often playing barefoot, Pele would shine shoes and sell peanuts to eventually earn money to buy a real ball & cleats. At 17 (the youngest player at the time according to FIFA), he would go on to win his 1st World Cup (Brazil vs. France) in 1958. "Pelé, whose presence for a 1969 exhibition match in Nigeria led to a two-day cease-fire in that country's bitter civil war so that both sides could see him play, became the only player to win three World Cups when Brazil was again victorious in 1962 (vs. Sweden) and 1970 (vs. Mexico)". On November 19th, 1969, he scored his thousandth goal resulting in "Pele Day". Pele came out of retirement in 1975, signing a \$7 Million contract with the New York Cosmos-he was then one of the highest paid athletes in the world. Finishing his athletic career with 1,283 goals in 1,367 games, Pele would go on to meet with foreign leaders, be honored with an International Peace Award, Athlete of the Century and *Pele Museum\_*was opened in Santos Brazil, in 2014. As a philanthropist, "Pelé used his celebrity status for good and advocated for numerous causes... poverty reduction, environmental protection, and raised millions of dollars for charities that helped children." In his words, "I was just a normal person who was granted the gift of being a futbol player. But I am absolutely certain that I have done much more for Brazil through futbol in my own way than many politicians who are paid to do so have done."

#### February 2 // ZIWEREKORU FUMUDO



Ziwerekoru Fumudo, is a Nigerian American comical satirist, writer, producer and model. Ziwe started strutting on her runway to fame via social media, initially on YouTube then onto Instagram Live. Her show Baited by Ziwe spread like wildfire during the COVID Pandemic. The 29 year old Northwestern University graduate confidently ignited uncomfortable conversations about race, identity and politics. Having double majored in Radio, Television, and Film and African-American studies, with a minor in Creative Writing, Ziwe was destined for nothing less than success. Her career as a writer "for various comedy shows and outlets including The Daily Show, The Colbert Report, The Onion, The Rundown with Robin Thede and Desus and Mero" led to her 2021 Showtime variety series ZIWE. Interviewing some renowned pop-culture characters, "Caroline Calloway, Jeremy O. Harris, Alison Roman, Alyssa Milano and Rose McGowan to name a few". Ziwe is not the least bit shy when on screen, as she says, "I'm not there to judge their performances. I'm just there to critique why they feel the need to perform the fact that they have 4.5 Black friends." Ziwe, won the Dorian TV Award in 2021 & 2022, has been nominated for six awards and just wrapped up its 2nd season.

#### February 3 // NONAME



Fatimah Nyeema Warner is the creator of the National Noname Book club, poet, rapper and record producer. Noname is a native of Chicago, she was raised by her grandparents, and began participating in local Slam Poetry & Spoken Word events as a teen and young adult. Her first musical appearance was in 2013 on Acid Rap, a collaboration with Chance the Rapper. Other appearances included The Water, Late Knight Special and Coloring Book. Noname then released Telefone- her own album on July 31st 2016, swiftly followed up with a debut, Room 25 in 2019. Noname then gained traction and formed the group Ghetto Sage, with performers Smino & Saba. Shortly after performing on tour, her long-awaited 3rd album Factory Baby was put on hold. Noname caught controversy when expressing her frustrations "I refuse to keep making music and putting it online for free for people who won't support me. If y'all don't wanna leave the crib I feel it. I don't want to dance on a stage for white people." In 2020, she reiterated that her music career was on pause to focus on education and her book club. Noname began reading and posting her reflections via Social Media. July 2019 began the launch of Noname Book Club networks which have developed into sister-clubs in Oakland, Los Angeles and New York. Noname began encouraging her followers to discontinue their subscriptions to Amazon Prime and promoted January 11th as National Library Card Registration Day. Soon, other celebrities & publishers like Heywood Books began donating texts and sharing their radical reading lists. *Noname's vision* was to create spaces where readers could engage, facilitate and participate in discussions. In March 2021, "Noname revealed on her Instagram story that work on a physical headquarters for *Noname Book Club* had begun, which would act as a center for political education classes, book drives, a library, food drives, book club meet-ups, tent drives, free art shows, free movie screenings, and a radical community library. "

#### February 4 // THE WAR & TREATY



Tanya Blout & Michael Trotter Jr. are married singers, songwriters and

performers known as The War & Treaty. Originally starting out as Blout & Trotter, their initial tracks were a blend of gospel soul and country with a dash of Rock n Roll. The couple coming from very different backgrounds met while performing on the same stage. Tanya, having been in the music and acting game for some time, was moved by Michael's military service and songwriting talent. Together, they are the first Black married duo in the Folk/ Country Americana music genre.

Their song *Five More Minutes* erupted out of a severe mental health crisis experienced by Michael as his wife found him in an act of contemplating suicide. Tanya's singing soothed her husband's soul and together they broke out in song... the rest is musical history. This dynamic duo has received rave reviews for their live performances. The couple came out with their first album Healing Tides in 2018 and their second album Heart's town in 2020. Together *Michael and Tanya demonstrate love*, compassion and community, the messages in the music are meant to heal and empower. In Michael's words... "We were seeing so much anger in the world as we were making this album, so we wanted to give people something that told them, 'Stop looking for the next Dr. King or Malcolm or Mother Teresa, and start looking for the first you."

#### February 5 // NAPOLEAN JONES-HENDERSON

Jones- Henderson has been creating and curating art of a divine kind for over half a century. He is one of the founders of AFRiCOBRA African Commune of Bad Relevant Artists. Jones-Henderson an artistic legend in his own right, is a mixed media artist/sculptor/weaver whom "principles—to create images inspired by the lived experience and cultures of people of the African diaspora in an accessible graphic style with shining Kool-

Aid colors—into woven tapestries, mosaic tile works, shrine-like sculptures, and varied works on paper." Jones-Henderson's passion for Pan-Africanism and racial justice transcends through his artistic expression.

Born November 23rd, 1943 in the windy city of Chicago, his talent earned him a year long study at the Sorbonne Student Continuum Student and Artists Center in Paris, France. Continuing his education, "Jones-Henderson enrolled in the Art Institute of Chicago and received his B.F.A. degree from there in 1971 and went on to earn with his M.A. degree from Northern Illinois University in 1971 and his M.F.A. degree from the Maryland Institute College Art in 2005." Jones-Henderson's earliest works were included in the 1970's exhibits at the Studio Museum in Harlem. His artwork is housed at the DuSable Museum of African American History, Schomburg Center of Research in Black Culture, Southside Community Art Center, Hampton University Museum, Art Institute of Chicago, and the Studio Museum in Harlem. Jones- Henderson's illustrious career includes his role as "Executive Director of the Research Institute of African and African Diaspora Arts, Inc., in Roxbury, Massachusetts in 1979. He then went on to serve in various academic positions at Malcolm X College in Chicago, the Massachusetts College of Arts, Emerson College in Boston." Brother Jones- Henderson credits his mentors- artistically engaged instructors at George Washington Carver High school that took him and other students on field trips to the tile warehouse, bottle factories, and fabric stores collecting a myriad of pieces for their students to create mosaics and magic.



## February 6 // JUANA RAMIREZ "LA ADVANZADORA"



La Advanzadora- The Advancer Juana Ramirez, was born into slavery January 1790, her African mother named Guadalupe was purchased by her father of Spanish origin, General Andres Rojas. Juana would later be adopted by "Doña Teresa Ramírez de Valderrama and worked as a launderer." While Venezuela was struggling to gain it's independence from the Spanish regime, Juana was appointed and put in charge of "The Battery of Women," an artillery unit comprised of 100 women. On May 25th, 1813 at age 23 La Advanzadora, strategically led her troops "to fight in what became the Battle of Alto de los Godos. The rebels were led by José Francisco Bermúdez, Manuel Piar, and José Tadeo Monagas. In the heat of combat, Ramírez picked up a dead Spanish officer's sword and, through gun smoke and a hail of bullets, held it aloft as she continued charging ahead toward the front line, earning her the moniker The Advancer /La Advanzadora"

"The monument, Juana La Avanzadora, was erected in her honor on Bolívar avenue in Maturín. On October 23, 2001 the symbolic remains of Juana Ramírez were inducted into the National Pantheon of Venezuela, the last resting place of heroes of the War for Independence and important figures in Venezuelan society." In 2015 she became the first black woman to be posthumously laid to rest in Venezuela's National Mausoleum of Heroes.

### February 7 // HUNTER'S POINT BIG FIVE



Eloise Westbrook (pictured above) along with Julia Commer, Bertha Freeman, Osceola Washington & Rosalie Williams made up the grassroots community group & legend "The Big 5". These women were mothers, workers and activists in the respected Bayview Hunter's Point district in San Francisco, Ca. Members of the Crispus Attucks club, the ladies were political pillars and strived for economic equity and environmental justice. Led by Westbrooks, who served as the President of the Bayview Hunter's Point Committee and then in 1955 became a staffer with the district's poverty board, she consistently advocated for resources and housing improvements. The Big Five first became active in the early 1960s, confronting poverty and discrimination in Hunters Point, filling the void left by weak religious leaders". The group is credited for holding officials accountable for the India Basin-Hunter's Point

Redevelopment Projects. In 1973, the group garnered national attention while participating in a 15 - person delegation. "They won fame by marching in Washington DC for funds that had been promised to complete the housing to replace temporary housing in Hunters Point, not leaving until they had secured a \$30 million grant. Streets and landmarks in the neighborhood have since been named in their honor." In her words, spoken in protest at SFSU <u>Westbrook told a crowd</u> "I only have but one life to give children, when I die I'm dead. And you'd better believe it. But I'm dying for the rights of people" (Bayview Footprints).



Soon, throughout the Monterey Bay area BLAAC will facilitate "Community Conversations," a kind of Pop-Up for social awareness and healing, as a place where we can begin and nurture badly needed conversations regarding race relations in our community."






