Of the three June celebrations, Juneteenth is the oldest. Texas slaves first learned of their emancipation on June 19th, 1865; the first Juneteenth was celebrated in that state the following year.

Although celebrated in various parts of the country for generations, it first gained nationwide attention following the murder of George Floyd on May 25, 2020 by Minneapolis Police Officers. The following year, President Joe Biden signed the law making Juneteenth a national holiday 155 years after its first celebration.

Father's Day was first celebrated in the State of Washington on June 19th, 1910. Washingtonians likely had little knowledge of the date's association with emancipation as Juneteenth was not celebrated in Washington until 1980. Father's Day was made a made a Federal Holiday by President Richard Nixon in 1972.

There are no Federally recognized holidays celebrating any aspect of

LGBTQ+ history but like the origins of Juneteenth and Father's Day there is a (not-quite-as) long history of unofficial and commercial celebrations. LGBTQ+ Pride month celebrates the Stonewall Uprising of June 28, 1969 when patrons of the Stonewall Inn - a gay club in Greenwich Village, New York City - had had enough of years of police harassment and their spur-of-the-moment rebellion became a foundational event of the Gay Rights Movement. In 2016, President Barak Obama declared the Stonewall Inn a national monument. The local organization *Monterey Peninsula Pride* will be celebrating our Pride event on July 23, 2022 starting at 11am at the Custom House Plaza in Monterey.

There are no less than 4 local Juneteenth Celebrations that I am aware of:

Terrell Maddox and Sean Carr's organization, the *Juneteenth Coalition*, kick things off with a string of events starting on Friday June 17th. Check out the Juneteenth Coalition website for more information about the organization and their Juneteenth *events*.

Asya Guillory, January Brown and the rest of the Salinas Juneteenth team is celebrating its second annual Juneteenth at 1pm on Sat June 18 in partnership with Hartnell College and have their own website describing their celebration at https://salinasjuneteenth.wordpress.com/

Seaside has at least two back-to-back celebrations on the same day. Rosalyn Green, Tinisha Dunn and the folks at the Monterey County Black Caucus are celebrating their third annual Juneteeth at Laguna Grande Park in Seaside in front of City Hall starting at 1 pm on Sat June 18th.

Meanwhile, Greg Daniels, Yvonne Kirkland and the members of the venerable RMSC (Recognizing Military Service Center) is hosting soul food dinner, dancing and music starting at 6pm on Sat June 18th at this historic club located at 2087 Del Monte Blvd., Seaside.

Prior to these events, the entire California State University system is kicking off its *Inaugural Juneteenth Symposium*. You can *register for the livestream*.





Historic Profile:

Audrey Lorde

1934-1991

Poet, essayist, and novelist Audre Lorde was born Audrey Geraldine Lorde on February 18, 1934, in New York City. Her parents were immigrants from Grenada. The youngest of three sisters, she was raised in Manhattan and attended Catholic school. While she was still in high school, her first poem appeared in *Seventeen* magazine. Lorde received her BA from Hunter College and an MLS from Columbia University. She served as a librarian in New York public schools from 1961 through 1968. In 1962, Lorde married Edward Rollins. They had two children, Elizabeth and Jonathon, before divorcing in 1970.

Her first volume of poems, *The First Cities* (Poets Press), was published in 1968. In the same year, she became the writer-in-residence at Tougaloo College in Mississippi, where she discovered a love of teaching. At Tougaloo, she also met her long-term partner, Frances Clayton. *The First Cities* was quickly followed with *Cables to Rage* (Paul Breman, 1970) and *From a Land Where Other People Live* (Broadside Press, 1973), which was nominated for a National Book Award. In 1974, she published *New York Head Shot and Museum* (Broadside Press). Whereas much of her earlier work focused on the transience of love, this book marked her most political work to date.

In 1976, W. W. Norton released her collection *Coal* and, shortly thereafter, published *The Black Unicorn* (1995). Poet *Adrienne Rich* said of *The Black Unicorn* that "Lorde writes as a Black woman, a mother, a daughter, a Lesbian, a feminist, a visionary; poems of elemental wildness and healing, nightmare and lucidity." Her other volumes include *Chosen Poems Old and New* (1982) and *Our Dead Behind Us* (1986), both published by W. W. Norton. Poet Sandra M. Gilbert noted not only Lorde's ability to express outrage, but also that she was capable of "of rare and, paradoxically, loving jeremiads."

Lorde was diagnosed with breast cancer and chronicled her struggles in her first prose collection, *The Cancer Journals* (Spinsters, Ink, 1980), which won the Gay Caucus Book of the Year award for 1981. Her other prose volumes include *Zami: A New Spelling of My Name* (Crossing Press, 1982), *Sister Outsider: Essays and Speeches* (Crossing Press, 1984), and *A Burst of Light* (Firebrand Press, 1988), which won a National Book Award. She received a fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts in

1981.

In the 1980s, Lorde and writer Barbara Smith founded Kitchen Table: Women of Color Press. She was also a founding member of Sisters in Support of Sisters in South Africa, an organization that worked to raise concerns about women under apartheid.

Audre Lorde was a professor of English at John Jay College of Criminal Justice and Hunter College. She was the poet laureate of New York from 1991–92. She died of breast cancer in 1992. *The Collected Poems of Audre Lorde* (W. W. Norton) was published in 1997. In 2021, Lorde was inducted to the *American Poets Corner* at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine.

From Surviving to Thriving: Celebrating PRIDE with Purpose



A word from Dr. David Rivera, Steve Fund Mental Health Expert

Audre Lorde's poem <u>"A Litany for Survival"</u> ends with the line, "So it is better to speak remembering we were never meant to survive." These words of wisdom from our Black lesbian ancestor serve as a call to action for those who are purposefully and systemically prevented from living authentically and unapologetically. Given the mounting and continued <u>legislative</u> and sociocultural threats towards marginalized communities, including LGBTQ youth, this poetic call to action remains as relevant today as it was in 1978 when it was written.

As society continues to harm LGBTQ youth of color at alarming rates, we must elevate and center these young people in efforts to achieve racial equity in mental health. According to *The Trevor Project (2021)*, LGBTQ youth of color continue to experience high rates of suicide attempts, with 31% of Native/Indigenous youth, 21% of Black youth, 21% of multiracial youth, 18% of Latinx youth, and 12% of Asian/Pacific Islander youth reporting attempts. Additionally, 50% of LGBTQ youth of color reported experiences with racial discrimination, which serves as another significant source of stress. Research on the mental health of LGBTQ youth of color further supports the connection between mental health compromises and experiences with discrimination (*Sutter et al.*, 2018; *Velez et al.*, 2017).

As we enter Pride Month, we celebrate the strengths and beauty of LGBTQI+ communities. Pride Month elevates affirming and validating attention to LGBTQI+ communities in ways that challenge the oppressive and hateful discourses and actions that these communities absorb year-round. As a gay Latinx man, I know there is a direct, positive impact on my wellbeing in environments where my identities are welcomed and affirmed, and Pride Month offers such an environment. However,

relegating the celebration and affirmation of LGBTQI+ people to one month is not enough, they deserve and need to be celebrated and affirmed year-round.

One way of keeping the spirit of Pride Month alive year-round is by ensuring that issues that impact the wellbeing of LGBTQI+ youth of color are embedded in the missions and work of all institutions that serve youth, including in education, healthcare, and social services. My co-edited book, *Affirming LGBTQ+ Students in Higher Education (Rivera, Abreu, & Gonzalez, 2022)*, published just in time for this year's Pride Month, offers critical consciousness-raising and practical strategies for creating affirming educational spaces for LGBTQ+ college students. My coeditors and I specifically call on institutions to direct "more resources on radical projects that seek to dismantle the White supremacist, anti-Black, colonial, patriarchal, ableist, transphobic, and heterosexist foundations from which institutions of higher education were built."

We need to dismantle these oppressive structures to achieve true liberation for LGBTQI+ youth of color. This will create environments that honor and affirm the strengths of LGBTQ+ people, such as hope, love, perseverance, gratitude, social intelligence, zest, and self-regulation, all of which have been linked to higher wellbeing and lower mental distress (*Antebi-Gruszka et al., 2021*). Young people are indeed speaking, and we need to listen.



"The fast-growing movement embracing diversity, equity and inclusion in the workplace (DEI) has the potential to be a game-changer in improving race relations. Both management and front-line employees can better understand these powerful issues and apply collaborative techniques through a 12-week online course taught by Monterey Peninsula-based "Black Leaders and Allies Collaborative (BLAAC)."

Although the overview course philosophy, called "Euro-centric Cultural Reflectionism" (ECCR), sounds complicated and academic, its key facets are actually quite relatable. The intimate classes focus on "racial recognition" that objectively explains past beliefs and attitudes about racial identity, perceptions and relations and helps shift one's perspectives towards forward-thinking behaviors.

Among many of the subjects covered, participants in the course will:

- Identify and talk about their feelings on common racial topics
- Learn to recognize embedded attitudes and reactions
- Develop an understanding for racial, economic, and social disparities
- Master the self-fulfilling concept of "perpetual circumstance"
- Realize the pain and beauty of blackness in America
- Acquire the tools to shift from a "fixing" mentality to a "working with" mentality

Says Williams, course facilitator, ECCR developer, founder and Executive Director of the local non-profit, nonpartisan organization: "Our historical patterns of poor race relations are not only a matter of what we do, but also a byproduct of who we are, both individually and corporately. ECCR is not only DEI training, but also a methodical course to promote and achieve a deeper sense of appreciation and healing as it relates to interracial relationships of all kinds. The positive feedback we're getting from those who've completed this course is tremendous. Several have praised it as a life-changing experience."
