Steven's Take On... The Extraordinary Mrs. Helen Rucker as she turns 90!

What a blessing it is to be in the presence of greatness! What a miracle to call the Great One friend! One of the remarkable things about Mrs. Rucker is that when she opens her home to you and looks favorably upon you, you truly feel like you are in the Inner Circle, when rationally you know you are just a bit player in h



you are just a bit player in her ever-expanding world.

Someone (I think it was Seaside Mayor Ian Oglesby) remarked publicly at her 90th birthday celebration that the hundred-or-so of us invited to celebrate her at the Embassy Suites on Sat Sept 3, 2022, were mere representatives of her multitude of admirers. That someone was right.

And yet, despite the best efforts of her legion of admirers who showered her with well-deserved and earnest praises, Mrs. Rucker still managed to give more than she received. After all, it was Mrs. Rucker (with perhaps the help of family and benefactors) that paid for the hotel and lunch! Furthermore, Mrs. Rucker insisted that she receive no gifts in the form of material presents but instead asked attendees to donate to CSU Monterey Bay's Helen Rucker Center for Black Excellence. Although preliminary, I do have first hand knowledge that tens of thousands of dollars were raised at her 90th birthday celebration for the Center that bares her name! (*Click Here* if you would like to contribute in her honor)

Outside of the donation request on the invitations and presence of donation slips in envelops at each table, the fund-raising element of her celebration was barely mentioned as the focus was entirely on recognizing Mrs. Rucker and her extraordinary accomplishments, accolades and contributions over a life masterfully lived.

There were some highlights from the afternoon that were my personal favorites:

- James Rucker III, her son, served as the emcee. It's always a delight see the only child, Mrs. Rucker raised...and how like his mother he is!
- Friend and live-in-assistant, Dinice Maiden, read a portion from Mrs. Rucker's (unpublished?) autobiography that detailed much of her life before she became famous and beloved on the Monterey Peninsula. We learned of her being raised by a single father in

Louisiana, of her love of reading -- and the pain of not being able to go to the public library due to Jim Crow segregation. We learned that she graduated high school at 15 and college at 18! We learned of her initial fear and later admiration for the Black Panthers while she was in Berkeley in the 60s. We learned of her fight and triumph against employment discrimination here on the Monterey Peninsula when she first attempted to break into the Monterey Unified School District.

- Speaking of school districts, P.K. Diffenbaugh, Superintendent of the Monterey Peninsula Unified School District announced that Seaside High School's library is being re-named after Mrs. Rucker.
- Mel Mason, co-founder of The Village Project, Inc. (TVPI) with his wife Regina, spoke of how Mrs. Rucker volunteering at the front desk in the early days of TVPI provided the budding non-profit with the clout, credibility and good will to become the amazing institution it is today (14 years later). In other words, because of the community's trust in Mrs. Rucker and her good judgement, if she backed The Village Project, so would they.
- Current Monterey County Branch President Yvonne Thomas on behalf of the Thomas sister spoke with appropriate pride at how their father -- the area's first Black banker -- was able to loan the Rucker Family the money for their lovely home on Mescal in Seaside, thus also making them neighbors in the process.
- Former U.S. Secretary of Defense Leon Panetta spoke of first meeting Mrs. Rucker when he served as legal consul to the Monterey County Branch NAACP. He spoke of her door-to-door campaign support when he originally ran for the U.S. Congress in the late 70s. But he also spoke of how Mrs. Rucker pulled no punches in holding people in power accountable and advocating for the issues of the Black Community. In essence, Secretary Panetta told the crowd, having God on your side doesn't mean a damn unless you can fight! And Helen can fight! He knew Helen Rucker would always give it to you straight.
- I was able to unveil the framed portrait of Helen Rucker painted by local artist/activist *Paul Richmond* that my family purchased and that will find its ultimate home at the Helen Rucker Center for Black Excellence (see image above).



Marquise is the Founder of *Rdevia*, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that unites people and groups in the #Fight4HBCUs. Rdevia has Members and Friends in 20 states plus China and Ghana. Rdevia provides resources and opportunities to



HBCU Prospects, Students, and Graduates. Rdevia has garnered the support of nationally recognized corporations such as Amazon Smile Foundation, Peerspace, Southeastern Grocers, Target, and Wawa. Rdevia's signature services are scholarships made possible through individual benefactors like Jarrod D. Benjamin (LA) and E. Renee Posey, Ed.D (FL) and care packages made possible through partnerships with organizations like the JCS Project (TX).

Marquise attended Florida Memorial University where he graduated with a B.A. in Criminal Justice in July 2016. In August 2016, Marquise started his M.A. in Higher Education at Lincoln University (MO) and earned said graduate degree at just 21 years old. The program, with an emphasis in HBCU Leadership, is the first and only of its kind in the nation and Marquise was one of the few to finish the pilot year as part of the inaugural cohort.

Marquise serves on the founding Advisory Board for the Florida Memorial University (FMU) Social Justice Institute. He is also an Honorary Staff Member of the White House Initiative on HBCUs (WHIHBCU), the firstever Vice President for Young Alumni Development of the Florida Memorial University National Alumni Association (FMUNAA)., and an AmeriCorps Alumnus.

Marquise has completed educational and leadership fellowships with Breakthrough Miami, the National Black College Alumni Hall of Fame (NBCA), Thurgood Marshall College Fund (TMCF), United Negro College Fund (UNCF), and the Walton Family Foundation. He is a registered Red Cross Volunteer certified in Disaster Preparedness.

Marquise has spoken at the White House, been interviewed by CNN and the South Florida Times, been cited in The Chronicle of Higher Education, published on HBCU Digest, and has visited more than 30 HBCU Campuses.

Marquise is the author of "*The Dad I Had*," a book for kids and dads based on his relationship with his dad.



In the News: "Gov. Newsom quashes bill to provide more funding for Black students"

"The sponsor of legislation that would have provided \$400 million in additional funding to raise the academic achievement of Black students pulled the proposal hours before likely passage Wednesday, after Gov. Gavin Newsom raised objections.

Newsom advisers did not say what those objections were, although four years ago, in a similar bill, Assembly legislative analysts <u>suggested that</u> <u>the legislation would violate Proposition 209</u>, a <u>1996</u> <u>constitutional amendment</u>. It bars preferential treatment by state and local governments in areas of public employment, education, and contracting based on sex, race and ethnicity. Two years ago, California voters reaffirmed Prop. 209 <u>by voting down an initiative to rescind</u> *it*.

[Black Folks Calendar Editor's Note: Providing funding to a chronically under-funded population is NOT preferential treatment!! It is a necessary attempt at more equitable treatment!]

Both the 2018 legislation and *Assembly Bill 2774*, sponsored by Assemblywoman Akilah Weber, D-San Diego, would have added funding for the first time for students in the lowest performing student group, which for decades has been Black students. Because the bill focused on student performance, not race, Weber and proponents said the bill would not violate Prop. 209.

Weber said she withdrew the bill after lengthy negotiations with the Newsom staffers. Both she and the Newsom administration were upbeat but circumspect in statements in which they agreed to work together on a commonly held goal.

Supporters of the bill were reported to be angry with the terms of a threepage agreement that Weber and the administration reached, and some would have preferred to send Newsom the bill to sign or veto.

The bill would have completed a five-year campaign initiated by Weber's mother, Shirley Weber, who held Akilah Weber's Assembly seat before Newsom appointed her secretary of state. Similar versions of the first bill also failed to become law despite substantial support.

"We have been failing Black kids for years," said Akilah Weber said earlier this year. "No one should bring that to the state, it should be something that the state has recognized and wants to fix on its own because you want the best for the kids."

In 2018-19, the last year before the pandemic, only 33% of Black students met or exceeded English language arts standards, and only 21% met or exceeded math standards on the state tests, compared with 51% in English language arts and 40% in math for all students in California.

Proportionally, twice as many white students passed the tests, and the gap was widest with Asian students; 79% of Asians met or exceeded standards in English language arts and 77% did so in math. In math, low-income white students outperformed non-low-income Black students.

"The data show that long-standing academic underperformance and systemic neglect have been chronic and not addressed," said Margaret Fortune, president and CEO of *Fortune School*, a group of 10 charter schools concentrated in the Sacramento area, serving primarily Black students. Fortune School and State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond co-sponsored the bill.

The bill would have amended the Local Control Funding Formula to add a new category of students qualifying for extra funding: the lowest performing student group not already covered by the law. Doing so would distribute an estimated \$400 million to 785 districts, starting in 2023-24, based on Black student enrollment.

Black students constitute 5.6% of the state's 5.9 million students. Since an

estimated 70% of Black students are low-income, the \$400 million would cover the 80,000 of 285,000 Black students enrolled in 2021-22 who are not low-income, foster or homeless students."

In the Spotlight: Emmanuel Church of God in Christ



When the McGee family, moved to Monterey Peninsula they sought out a church home and became faithful working members of the Victory Temple COGIC, under the pastoral leadership of Bishop S. R. Martin. Pastor McGee remained there until he received and accepted the call of the Lord to become a Pastor.

As the founding pastor of the Emmanuel COGIC, Elder McGee, required the guidance and direction of the Lord. As he yielded to the calling God placed on his life he submitted himself to the Lord with much fasting and praying that the right decisions would be made. As Pastor McGee sought the Lord for a location, he relied on Hebrew 11:1 "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for and the evidence of things not seen". Pastor McGee continued in fasting and prayer to God and encouraging himself. The Lord directed Pastor McGee to Reverend Johnson, pastor of Bethel Missionary Baptist Church. They were in the process of relocating the church to its current location, Elm Avenue and Imperial Street, Seaside, CA. Reverend Johnson put him in contact with the property owner of Emmanuel COGIC first location, on the corner of San Lucas and Broadway.

Many great leaders, pastors, teachers, preachers, missionaries, district, state and national workers began their work for the Lord as a part of the Emmanuel COGIC, Seaside family.


In 2013, Pastor McGee passed the vision of the Emmanuel COGIC to Elder Eugene B. Jones, a faithful member of the ministry and a blessed preacher who was raised up under Pastor McGee. Pastor McGee's legacy will be upheld as God continues to be Faithful to this ministry and all generations that have come through.

In the Spotlight: Rev. Eugene Jones

Dr. Eugene B. Jones is the 9th of 11 children born to the late Pastor of the Emmons Memorial Church of God By faith located in of Cocoa, FL.

Raised in the fear and admonition of the Lord, Pastor Jones was saved at an early age



and accepted his calling into the ministry. After serving as the Assistant Pastor of the Emmanuel Church of God In Christ, in Seaside, California for over 20 years. On June 8, 2014, he was officially installed as the Pastor and Shepard of the Emmanuel Church of god in Christ, where Superintendent Emeritus Welton McGee, the founder and father, passed on to him the shepherd's staff.

During his pastoral installation service Pastor Jones received a Doctor's of Divinity degree from the Living Faith School of Ministry, Champaign, Illinois, conferring upon him all the rights, privileges, and honors of Doctorate.

Pastor Jones serves as the Superintendent of the Monterey District Church of God In Christ. Under the leadership of Bishop N. A. Bullock, Pastor Jones also serves as Chairman of the Ordination Board, Chairman of the General Assembly and the Treasurer of the Pastors and Elders Counsel for the Church of God in Christ California Northwest Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction.

Pastor Jones has been married to his wife, Missionary Mary Grace Lewis Jones, a native daughter of the Church Of God By Faith, for 37 years. They have three children, Dominique (Kemar), Detrek (Christina), and Danielle (Michael); one granddaughter Kennedy and two grandsons Miles and Manoah.

He retired from the California Department of Corrections in 2012, as a Correctional Administrator with 30 dedicated years of service. Pastor Jones has been a longtime supporter of the CSUMB Harambee African Heritage Men's Support Group and Community Gathering at the Personal Growth and Counseling Center. Pastor Jones has also served on the CSUMB's Super Saturday Committee.

Pastor Jones' constant request is found in 2 Thessalonians 3:1 "Finally, brethren, pray for us, that the word of the Lord may have free course, and be glorified, even as it is with you."

The NAACP is pushing for elected officials to go beyond the new federal student loan debt forgiveness program to help minority students. Federal data shows Black students are one of the fastest growing groups borrowing money for education over the last two decades and experts say minority students often borrow at much higher rates too. "We need it [debt] canceled completely or at least at \$50,000 minimum," said Aiden Thompson, a sophomore at Howard University.
